17th Interregional Tour 2014

While beginning this message I was watching and pulling for my horse California Chrome. So the chrome fits right in with part of our Interregional trip to Salado, TX. And because we had our eyes feasting on a few rare beauties, like a brand new 1931 V12 Cadillac Series 370 A convertible coupe owned by our new NTXCLC members, William (Bill) and Jeannie Clark who join us all the way from San Antonio.

The Interregional tour with North Texas Region being the host region and our guest, the Gulf Coast Region gathered in Salado, Texas for a superb week-end of socializing, car-barn flying, and touring of the Central Texas area, South of Temple. Twenty-four members and family brought thirteen Cadillacs and LaSalles of various years and models to participate in the tour. And for the first time we had the presence of our Region Vice President, Tim Coy, all the way from Colorado.

The 17th annual Interregional meet on May 19, 30, 31 and June 1 was headquartered at the old historic STAGECOACH Inn in Salado, Texas. The North Texas Region Cadillac & LaSalle Club had the privilege of hosting this tour – and that also gained it the honors of being selected as a NATIONAL DRIVING TOUR for points earned toward the CLC National Grill Badge.



Our driving tour began for some NTX members meeting in Cleburne and visiting Clifton

Classic Chassis Museum at Clifton, TX. This was a beautiful, 20,000 square foot remodeled museum containing @35 classic cars. It was a very enjoyable visit. Some shiny cars, lots of chrome, and many bullets to view along with the memorabilia belonging to Dr. Terry Watson. Royce Graham was very gracious overseer and curator. Afterwards We passed by the ClifTex theater. It is Texas oldest continuously operating movie theater since 1917. we stopped at the Su-



lak's Cech Bakery and Meats in Clifton where we enjoyed a nice lunch of Czech sausage kolaches.

Our tour of 169 miles took us through many small Texas communities, such as Cleburne Johnson Co Courthouse. All along the way ,we view many scenic sights, hills and many historical markers one being the Chisholm Trail known as the famous cattle drive that played a major role in Texas history and the Livestock Auction. Then we had a stunning



view of passing many more communities such as Morgan, Meridian the home of the quaint



Bosque Co Court house that was built in 1886. Mountain, Gatesville home of the last drive-in picture show and some of the correctional housing for female prisoners. In Flat we crossed over a great view of the Leon River, and in Belton we passed by the home of Mary Hardin Baylor University. History and beautiful scenery, all in one nice package. Plus a great picture of the cars parked on the hill and peering down into the LHoist Limestone quarry.



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
The Meridian cattle auction yard was note worthy, plus the junk yard with army trucks, tractors trucks, and cars. Little country towns each with its history entertained us on the drive.

Arriving in Gatesville we passed a correctional facility for women. On the north side of Fort Hood, we crossed over cattle guards and saw cattle grazing alongside the road noting the military camp sites. In Belton we passed another historical courthouse and the Mary Hardin Simmons University, finally arriving in Salado. It was a very scenic enjoyable back road drive. Our tour of 134 miles had taken us through many small Texas communities, such as Cleburne with its scenery and hills and many historical markers of the Chisholm Trail, Morgan, Meridian, Mountain, Gatesville, home of the last drive-in picture show, Flat, and Belton, Texas. History and beautiful scenery, all in one nice package.



By evening we were settled in to the historic Stagecoach Inn, Salado. This hotel was founded in 1861 and is the longest continuously operating hotel in the state of Texas. The Inn was built as a stagecoach stop along the Chisholm Trail. The guest book features General George A. Custer, Robert E. Lee, and Jesse James, along with cowboys, desperados, and travelers.

Friday morning, after a kolache breakfast in the hospitality room the Cadillacs and LaSalle headed out to the back roads of the fields of crops and Cech churches & steeples toward Taylor, Texas through Walburg, Texas. The area was settled n different communities by Germans, Czech/Bohemians, and Swedish settlers. The spires of churches depict their background and customs. Passing the Corn Hill community, the Holy Trinity Catholic church has 3 languages Latin, Czech, and German. In Jonah we passed by a cemetery





In Taylor, Texas we visited the auto restoration shop of Jeff's Resurrections. Jeff Snyder and his wife and his restoration staff gave us tour of some very interesting work in progress of different autos. He was restoring some very pretty and very high dollar cars all way from England and Italy, and was also very warm to Cadillacs. Afterwards we motored over the



famous Louie Mueller's BBQ and had a superb lunch of their famous brisket, sausage, and ribs. Originally opened in 1936 as a Safeway Grocery, it has been a family business ever since.

Leaving Taylor we passed the SPJST --originally charted as the Slovanska Podporujici Jednota Statu of Texas , the Slavonic Benevolent fraternal Order of the State Of Texas for the social centers for Czechs.

We crossed over Granger Lake and Dam, built in the U.S. Corps of Engineers 1970's for flood control reservoir on the San Gabriel River. We stopped for some scenic beauty and refreshment.



Afterwards we all returned to Salado for an afternoon of relaxation and shopping at some of the unique shops, many just enjoying, visiting and re-acquainting themselves in the hospitality room.
