PATE SWAP MEET 2016

This year the Pate Swap Meet was bigger than ever, and had fewer complaints than ever before. More vendors, more customer traffic, and more work, and it was more fun than years before.

At the Pate Swap Meet you could find everything from a car part for years gone by, cool old bicycles, car signs, and I even saw a girlfriend mannequin sitting on a park bench. Something for everybody. There were new car parts, complete and partial cars, motorcycles, car-glass, car-related clothing, and let's not forget the good food that the vendors served up for everyone.

There were people walking, people on handicap scooters, and some sitting in wagons that were pulled by dad. Some vendors had special deals for Pate workers. Wallace Wade Tires had a \$100 drawing for those who registered. Our Treasurer, Jim Hanson, won the drawing.

By the numbers: it was reported that there were 1,143 exhibitors/vendors on 8,782 spaces, 233 cars in the car corral, and about 40 cars in the new car show. The North Texas Region, along with two other car clubs laid over 9,192 6"x3" vendor space tabs and NTX set up 133 street signs on the Saturday before the swap meet started, and then retrieved them on the Sunday when the meet was completed. Additionally, on Wednesday we repaired over 75 signs damaged by the big storm on Tuesday night. Big job; big results.

2016 Inter-Regional Meet Huntsville, Texas



This year's 19th Inter-Regional, hosted by the Gulf Coast Region, and with the North Texas Region and the Central Texas Region members, was an interesting and rewarding get-together. Starting with super Texas weather, gray skies and the threat of rain, the mild temperatures made for open convertibles and comfortable clothing.



On Friday, the first day of our adventure, with Duane and Jenny Medley leading our Cadillac caravan in a 1958 Cadillac Eldorado Biarritz convertible, we first visited famous statue of Sam Houston which can be seen from Interstate 45. The statue is 67 feet tall and stands on a ten foot tall base. It is considered the second largest freestanding statue in the U.S.





From there we went to the Texas Prison Museum in Huntsville. The museum staffer, retired warden Jim Willett, gave us an interesting and detailed study of the history and the makeup of the 115 prisons in the Texas Prison System, along with the six facilities in the Huntsville area. We even got to see "Old Sparky," the chair that sent 361 Texas inmates to their final reward. On the left he is showing us a model of the prison at Huntsville made by prisoners.

On Saturday we visited the Old Ironworks Restoration Shop in Montgomery, TX, owned and created by Richard Mitchell. Many rare, one-of-a-kind cars are found here. It has the largest Stutz car collection in the U.S,

Disiting a car club show as an exhibitor or an attendee, it's easy to lose yourself in the love of your hobby. There are so many amazing classic cars, muscle cars, exotic cars, and all kinds of other vehicles to see. It can all come crashing back down though, literally, if your valuable car is struck.

Car crashes happen everywhere, even at a car show. It doesn't matter how careful you might be; you can still be unlucky. Accidents can occur while transporting to or from the show, or even in the parking lot. It's especially bad for collectible cars, and it can mean a permanent drop in value. That's without even getting started on repair bills or medical costs if someone is hurt.

Thankfully, Texas is one of the many states where every driver is required by law to have a car insurance policy. If you're unlucky and find yourself in an accident, you can claim reimbursement for damages. That means expenses like medical bills, car repairs, and even things like lost wages due to missed work could be covered.

It's not a sure thing, though. To give yourself the best chance of receiving damages in a personal injury claim, it's vitally important to educate yourself. You have to understand how insurance claims work in Texas, and you need to know what to do after the accident.

Understanding Fault After an Accident

In Texas, car accidents are evaluated under a modified comparative fault law. What this means is the insurance companies, and if necessary the court, decide who caused an accident. Accidents are always thought to have been caused by one driver or the other, or fault can be shared between them. An accident is never blameless under the law.

The reason for this is because when calculating damages, a driver can't collect any compensation if they are more than 50% at fault. If they are less than 50% at fault, then their damages are reduced by their percentage of fault. For example, if a driver is awarded \$1,000 in a personal injury claim but is found to be 25% at fault for the accident, then their damages are reduced by 25%. They will only actually receive \$750.

The factors that insurance companies use to determine fault are basically the rules of the road that every driver must follow, along with some common sense. Drive safely and follow traffic laws, and it's not likely that you will be found at fault for an accident.

Here are a few examples of things that can be used to assign fault:

- Driving over the speed limit
- Making illegal turns, like turning from the wrong lane
- Ignoring posted traffic signs
- Turning without signaling first
- Failing to maintain your vehicle to safety standards. Driving a car without functional brakes is a sure way to be found at fault for an accident.
- Rear-ending another car

When assigning fault, the insurance companies look at all the evidence that is presented to them. They will take into account police reports, bystander testimony, the statements of both drivers involved in the accident. They will also look at the damage to both vehicles, their position and speed, and the surrounding environment. For example, in a car show it's common for cars to be parked all day long. The driver of a car that strikes a parked vehicle is likely to be found 100% at fault.

Because the assignment of fault is based on evidence, it's important that you gather as much of it as you can. If you need to file a personal injury claim, you will need to be able to describe what happened, why it wasn't your fault. Most of all, you will need to prove it.

First Steps After the Accident

To maximize your chances of receiving damages, take these steps right after the crash if you are able.

- Locate Bystanders Talk to everyone nearby. It's likely that at least one person, and probably more than one, had a clear view of the crash and can describe what happened. Try to get a clear picture of exactly what happened from their point of view. Take down their contact information. If any event staff were nearby, don't neglect to speak with them as well.
- Talk to the Other Driver You and the driver of the other car should exchange driver's license information, contact information, and insurance information.
- Take Pictures Most important of all, take pictures of everything. The damage to both cars, their locations, any debris on the ground, any nearby distractions or damage to the road that might have contributed to the accident. Photographic evidence is the primary means of proving exactly what happened.
- Give a Police Statement Shortly after the accident, a police officer should show up to take official statements and file an accident report. Be ready to speak with him and give a complete and clear account of the accident. It's important to be truthful, and it's just important to have all the facts ready. If the accident wasn't your fault, then it's up to you to make sure the officer has all the information needed to come to the same conclusion.
- Go to the Hospital If you were in the car when the accident happened, seek medical attention. Even if you don't feel any pain, go anyway. Some injuries don't present immediately. More to the point of a personal injury claim, it's important to have it on record that you went to the doctor, and what they found.

Collectible Car Insurance Policies

At a car show, many of the exhibitors might have collectible car insurance policies. This is a special kind of auto insurance that protects the investment in a classic car, and it does a few things that more typical auto insurance doesn't.

From the standpoint of the policy holder, the most important feature of a collectible car insurance policy is that it guarantees a certain payout in the event of a total loss. Unlike cars kept for personal or business use, collectible cars don't lose value over time. Therefore, the value of the policy remains constant.

For someone filing a personal injury claim, the most important feature is the special medical coverage during car shows. Slips and falls in the car's exhibition space may be covered, and the policy may offer coverage even if the policy holder isn't the one driving. This is especially important at shows where event staff may need to move the vehicle around during the day.

Basically, if you do find yourself in an accident while at the show, be sure to check if the other driver's auto insurance has special provisions for car shows. It's likely that it will, and that's typically good news. It will be easier to receive damages, assuming you were not at fault.

Writing Your Demand Letter


After gathering your evidence and receiving medical attention, it's time to get started on your personal injury claim. Don't leave this too long. Expenses can pile up quickly, and it's important to get them taken care of as soon as reasonably possible.

Begin by writing a demand letter to the insurance company of the at-fault driver. Include a clear and accurate account of events, and specify the amount of money you need to cover your expenses.

Back up your letter with the evidence you gathered, as well as supporting documentation like repair estimates, medical bills, and police statements.

The best case scenario is that the insurance company will agree you were not at fault. In this case, they will pay your sought damages and you can move on with your life. If not, then you may need to contact an attorney and investigate the possibility of filing a lawsuit. **
