

Where the Rubber Meets the Road

Tire history begins with automotive history.

I.



Karl Benz (November 25, 1844-April 4, 1929)

invented the gasoline-powered car, but the precise date of this invention requires a patchwork of research. Benz demonstrated a one-cylinder two-stroke engine on New Year's Eve 1879. Commercial success with this engine enabled him to create a lightweight car. In 1885, The "Benz Patent Motorcar" became the first. Registered in Berlin with the German Imperial Patent Office, January 29, 1886, the patent number is DRP 37435. Some writers refer to this patent office document as the "automobile's birth certificate."

Benz brought his car to the German market in June 1886 as the Benz Motorwagen (below right). A two seater, this car had a single-cylinder four-stroke engine, a tubular steel frame, a differential, and three wirespoke wheels. The engine output rating was 0.75 horsepower. A further look at details reveals an automatic intake slide, a controlled exhaust valve, an electric vibrator ignition with

spark plug, and water evaporation cooling. This car rode on metal wheels covered with rubber and filled with air.

Pneumatic tires made their debut almost ten years ahead of their general acceptance. The 1888 Benz gasoline powered car had rubber pneumatic tires. In1895, a race from Paris to Bordeaux increased popular usage of these tires.

Robert William Thomson (1822–1873) invented the pneumatic tire.

He patented it in 1845. The invention worked well, but it failed to attract consumer attention because it was too expensive.

John Boyd Dunlop (1840–1921), a Scottish veterinarian receives credit for the first practical pneumatic

tire. Dunlop tested and patented his pneumatic tire in Great Britain in 1888. He secured an American patent in 1890. This tire had an interesting origin. Dunlop began by cutting up a garden hose, shaping it into a tube, flating it, and attaching it to his son's tricycle!

- In 1895, André Michelin with his brother Edouard installed pneumatic on an automobile.
- Philip Strauss invented the combination tire and inner tube in 1911. His company, Hardman Tire & Rubber marketed them.
- In 1903, P. W. Litchfield of the Goodyear Tire Company patented the first tubeless tire. De first new-car application came with the 1954 Packard.
- Mountable rims, introduced in 1904, enabled drivers to repair flats.
- In 1908, Frank Seiberling invented tread tires to improve traction.
- B.F. Goodrich Company invented longer life tires by adding carbon to the rubber. When this happened in 1910, tires no longer had the white color of natural rubber.
- In 1937, Goodrich invented the synthetic rubber tire fabricated of a substance called Chemigum. DuPont, in 1931, introduced synthetic rubber to American industries. Synthetic rubber changed the face of the auto tire industry. Its ancestor, vulcanized natural rubber, made Charles Goodyear a manufacturing giant.

Here are a few dates of interest.

- Joseph Priestley discovered (c.1770) rubber's use as an eraser—thus the name.
- In 1823, Charles Macintosh found a practical process for waterproofing fabrics.
- Charles Goodyear (1800–1860) discovered vulcanization in 1839, which revolutionized the rubber industry.



Rainforest dwellers in South America had used natural rubber for generations, but an accident gave it a new identity. In 1839, Charles Goodyear accidentally dropped rubber and sulfur on a hot stove. De mixture charred but remained pliable. He named his infant "kitchen chemistry" process vulcanization in honor of the Greek god of fire, Vulcan. The fully developed version of this process transforms the white sap of the hevea brasiliensis tree into the product that we know.

Briefly described, vulcanization converts natural rubber or similar polymers into durable materials by adding sulfur or other curing agents. These modify the polymers by forming bridges between individual polymer chains. The vulcanized material is less sticky and has other properties superior to natural tree sap.

Products made with vulcanized rubber include tires, shoe soles, hoses, and conveyor belts. Hard rubber, sometimes sold under the brand name ebonite or vulcanite makes its appearance in clarinet and saxophone mouthpieces, bowling balls, and hockey pucks. Although vulcanization is a relatively recent process, ancient people cured rubber by other means.

IV.

Modern vehicle tires depend on synthetic rubber for their structure.

Beginning in the 1890s, the growing presence of motor vehicles increased the demand for rubber. At the Bayer laboratory in Elberfeld, Germany, a team headed by Fritz Hofmann polymerized Isoprene, the first synthetic rubber in 1909.


In 1910, Russian scientist Sergei Vasiljevich Lebedev synthesized the first rubber polymer from butadiene.

By 1925, the price of natural rubber had increased to the point that chemical companies tried to produce synthetic rubber that could compete with the qualities natural rubber.

In 1931, DuPont, under the direction of E. K. Bolton, developed one of the first successful synthetic rubbers known as neoprene. Neoprene, resistant to heat, oil, and gasoline, found its use in fuel hoses and insulating materials for machinery.

B.F. Goodrich Company scientist Waldo Semon developed a cheaper version of synthetic rubber knownas Ameripol in 1940. Ameripol made synthetic rubber more cost effective and helped meet US needs during World War II.

Various petroleum-based small molecules make up synthetic rubber, like other polymers. (A polymer is a large molecule—macromolecule—composed of many repeated small subunits.) Polymers vary from synthetic plastics (like polystyrene) to natural biological polymers (such as DNA) that are essential to the structure ofliving organisms. The large molecular mass of these polymers produces toughness, viscosity, and elasticity.

I used to hold the opinion that the test of tire life used a penny and Lincoln's head. Wrong! That might be adequate to measure tread wear, but there is more. Tires carry a number to indicate date and location of manufacture. Tire Tech online enlightened me. Follow this link for complete information. http://www.tirerack.com/tires/tiretech/techpage.jsp?techid=11

I believe the following summary is important.

Since 2000, the last four digits of the Tire Identification Number carry vital information. Two digits identify the week made immediately followed by two digits that identify the year of manufacture.


The Tire Identification Number for tires produced before 2000 presumed that tires would not be in service for ten years. Older tires contain ome of the same information as today's tires do, but they tell the week and year of production in only the last three digits.

The first two digits of the old marking system identify the week a tire was manufactured. These precede a single digit used to identify the year. Since a single digit indicated the year, for example, a "7" could mean 1997, 1987, or good grief 1977! No matter what decade it is, anything with the three-digit date code is too old and is unsafe use.

Perhaps this Internet photo will help identify the numbers on your tires. For concerns of safety and economy, collectors should check on the age and condition of their tires. Age creeps up on tires as it does on us.


