

PATE Swap Meet Month

April is Pate Swap Meet Month. It's that time of year again when the sixteen car clubs that comprise the Pate Swap Meet Association gather in the last week in April to put on the largest swap meet in the Midwestern United States, and possibly the second largest in the country. This is the 46th year of this annual event, and the North Texas Region of the Cadillac & LaSalle Club is a major player. This four-day event, which took many months of hard work by members of the member car clubs, has everything in the way of automobiles, motorcycles, and most anything transportation related, including parts of all kinds, accessories, automobilia, street rods, hot rods, antiques, classics, and loads of hard-to-find vintage items.

The North Texas Region mission is very important, as we are responsible to create, maintain, and to lay on the ground in eight zones, a special marker for each vendor space so the vendors who paid for their space can locate it. This year we are again using a new tile marker that has a vinyl sticker over-

laid on a rubber marker tile. There are approximately 9,160 tiles, each hand-prepared by members of three car clubs, and hand-laid in the proper position on the Texas Motor Speedway west parking lot on the Saturday before the week of the swap meet. On the last Sunday of the swap meet all the tiles are recovered, sorted, missing tiles noted, and then stored

for the next year's swap meet.

We are also responsible to mark the streets with 133 street signs so vendors and patrons can find their way around this massive site. Before they are set out, PVC poles have to be corrected from the previous year and made ready. Each 6-foot sign has two streets marked, and is screwed into a concrete base that weighs about 50 pounds. These signs are completed by a NTX crew that has plenty of muscle. On the last day of the swap meet the signs have to be taken down and stored for another year.

Why do we do it? Because we are part of a large active organization that has the same interests we do. It's hard work, and it's fun. The fun part comes on the swap meet days when we see old friends and greet new ones who come by our yellow and white hospitality tent on the corner of Andretti and Third Street, when we sign up new members, and when we show off some of our Cadillacs on display in front of our tent.

These pages will have some pictures of our work and thank you for those who helped and participated. If you didn't make it this year, try to schedule some time for next year, as we would love to have you aboard.



After an orientation by NTXCLC Pate Swap Meet Director, assignments of duties and the issuing of eight golf carts, instructions on walki-talkies, and issuing of maps and tubs, the setup day begins. Using the new parking lot markings, we usually finish up at about 3:00 p.m. with some minor work left for the next week. All in all, it is a good work effort and a lot gets done.

HARLEY EARL

(November 22, 1893 - April 10, 1969)

March, 1927, 91 years ago last month, when General Motors unveiled its 1927 LaSalle—the first assembly-line car designed by a stylist rather than an engineer.

Harley Earl, the LaSalle's designer, was only 33 when the LaSalle first hit American roads, but he was already a visionary. Earl's career path came into focus during a family outing in 1910, according to the Automotive Hall of Fame. The 16-year-old, who would later work in his father's carriage shop, "found a clay-filled hollow" near his family's campsite and "sculpted the clay into fantasy cars more elegant than any that existed at the time."

By the time that Harley had worked just one year for General Motors, he was overseeing a staff of fifty designers, supervising design and color choices for all Fisher Body-built products at General Motors. The longer he worked there, the more influential that he became.

"In the beginning, he shared control of design with the powerful Fisher Brothers," reads an article found at the GM Heritage Center Site, "but eventually he would gain complete control of automotive styling, both exterior and interior as well as embracing the design of auto exhibits, experimental dream cars, streamlined trains, home appliances, batteries, radios, and all other products and accessories manufactured by General Motors."

Although Harley struggled to compromise with engineers and although he created designs that failed, he had many more successes; he:

Blended headlights and fenders into the overall car to create a smooth appearance

Rid cars of their luggage rack and created the modern trunk

Concealed the front radiator grille

Eliminated running boards

Lengthened and lowered formerly clunky car bodies

Lowered the passenger compartment for a more comfortable ride

Used modeling clay to create prototypes of cars so that he could easily make changes before working with metal

Introduced the four-headlight system, two-tone paint and the one-piece-wrap-around windshield

Designed the Cadillac Aero-Dynamic Coupe in 1933, the first vehicle with a one-piece, all steel roof; previous car roofs were made from wooden frames and a piece of canvas

Designed the Buick Y-Job, called the world's first concept car, intended to test advanced technologies and the public's reaction to them, rather than for mass production; cutting edge features included fender extensions over the doors, headlamps that disappeared, flush door handles, a convertible top that was covered by metal and electric window regulators.

Became a vice president at General Motors in 1940

Incorporated tailfins in Cadillacs in 1948, after being inspired by the P-38 Lightning fighter plane used in World War II; fins continued to grow in both size and popularity on Caddies until 1959 and made appearances through the mid-1960s

Focused on creating dream cars in the 1950s, which were unique cars that would be sent around the country, to show Americans the future of transportation; innovations during this decade include pillarless hardtops, the first true American sports car (1953 Chevrolet Corvette) and the Firebird gas turbine program

Harley retired in 1959 and moved to Florida. He once said that, "I dream automobiles" and, because of him, a car's style became an important component of new launches.

My 1968 Cadillacs

The articles in the March CLC Self Starter magazine about the 1968 Cadillac brought back some really great memories for me. I had two fantastic '68 Caddies and they were two of the best automobiles I ever owned.

My first was a Kashmir Ivory (yellow) Hardtop Sedan DeVille with a black top and black leather interior. The car was fully loaded and had been in a major accident, but the dealer in Savannah, Ga., claimed they rebuilt the car to like-new condition. So, in 1991 I bought the car and it was a great car.



I was in the Army at the time, stationed at Ft. Stewart, Georgia, as a flight instructor and operations officer. I was working for a Colonel who was both very professional and also friendly, which made the assignment enjoyable. So, one day I drove the Cadillac out to the Liberty Army Airfield flight line and as I parked this huge boat of a car, the Colonel was just getting ready to board his own personal little car. His comment, which I loved and never forgot was, "Something wrong with this picture – a Captain in a Cadillac, and a Colonel in a Volkswagen..." I was the only Cadillac on post at that time. Some soldiers have class...



A few years later I was able to purchase a well-used, but in excellent condition, a 1968 Coupe DeVille in Baroque Gold Metallic, with Beige Domino Cloth and Leather. It had many options including a tilt and telescope steering wheel and an AM/FM radio. I was able to do almost all repairs myself, the few that there were, including replacing the starter without a hoist or jacks. This car was comfortable, good looking, roomy, and powerful, with the 472-cubic inch engine pumping out 375 horses.

One evening as I was tooling along down Main Street in Springfield, Ohio, where I grew up, and where I raised hell street racing as a teenager, but now a married man with a nice family and a job. I was stopped at a traffic light in my gold Caddy with my wife in the passenger seat, just enjoying the ride and behaving myself, when a mean, nasty Chevy Impala running a 350-cubic inch mill, pulled up alongside and began to gun his noisy V-8 engine to get my attention. OK, he had it, my attention, that is. Looked like a challenge, for sure, for sure. So, when the light turned green he floored his Chevy and I put the skinny pedal on the right in my luxurious Cadillac down to the bottom of the soft carpet. The Chevy's tires were screaming and smoking, but the Cadillac's four-barrel carburetor had opened so fast that the engine initially bogged down from the blast of raw fuel. The secondary throttles were wide open and there was some real action going on there. Then, all of a sudden, the engine fired up real strong and the car stood on its rear haunches and we were off, running like the wind for the next traffic light, several blocks away. My bride had no idea, no warning, of what was happening, and was screaming at me to STOP! No way, I was winning, defending the honor of my 1968 Cadillac. I won the race, got beat up by my spouse, and — I really loved that car.


