


One of the missions of the North Texas Region Cadillac & LaSalle Club, as a member of the Pate Swap Meet partnership, is to set up street sign along the streets and rows. There are 133 street signs and it takes a real effort for them to be erected and placed.





All the sign poles are going to the scrap heap.

Here the parts and tools to set up a Pate Street Sign. We have the sign blade—a metal angle with the street name (named after famous Pate People or racing personnel), the PVC pole with cut slots to hold the sign blade, which is subject to ultra-violet light damage causing it to be very brittle after a week in the sun, the male socket at the poles end which is held on by using plumber's primer and glue, and which is screwed into a 55 lb. concrete base with a plastic female socket. To assist in screwing the sign pole into the base we use a lubricant spray. The notebook on the left has maps of each zone and descriptive placement of each of the 133 signs. The time to install a sign after the concrete base is set is from 2 minutes for one with a poles that screws in easily and the sign is ready to insert into the slot, to up to 15 minutes for tone that need new lettering on a blank blade, a new male socket, and sometimes a switch out of bases.

The Story Of Red

Three years ago, I was able to talk (nag? beg?) my long-suffering wife, Kathleen, into letting me buy a 2006 Cadillac XLR. Kathleen is not what you would call a 'car person'. To her, a car is a tool to be used for a purpose – getting from point A to point B. She has no more love for a sports car than she does a pickup or a bus. So, when I was finally able to get her to go with me to 'look at' an XLR, it came as a real surprise.

I've always wanted a convertible, but refused to have a ragtop with their rotting, wind noise, and bad fitting problems. Needless to say, that limited my choices over the years. Finally, in the early 2000s, three models came on the scene that caught my interest: the Lexus SC300, Mercedes SL500, and the Caddy XLR. The SL500 is a wonderful car, but you see them all over the place, and working on them requires huge infusions of cash. Also, I was really struck by the lines and looks of the XLR. Nothing else on the road looks like them. I researched their service history, problems, and reliability. After satisfying my questions, I settled on the XLR and began to haunt the for-sale ads.

I watched for over a year before spotting a good possibility at a local dealership. After plotting for days on how to talk Kathleen into taking a look, she said yes, and off we went. PROTECTING COLLECTABLES

As a current retiree and one who is fascinated by collectable cars, I have studied numerous articles about planning and protecting the things we collect and hold dear. Whether you are a beginner or an avid collector you need to be aware of certain problems and mis-steps.

Some collectors of cars (and artwork, movie items, sports stuff, stamps, coins) have spent years collecting and assume that this collection is a minor to a major part of their wealth and estate. The problem is many fail to consider what is required to protect the value and to plan for the maintenance and disposition of the collection in the future. This includes failure to insure properly, fail to have current appraisals, and few who inherit collections even want them.

Here are some things you as collectors should keep in mind.

First of all, do not assume you are going to make money with your collectables. Cars especially have their values and worth float up and down constantly, because of market conditions, trends, the economy, and the way the vehicle is stored, driven, and maintained. Some, if not most, cost more to own than stocks, bonds, and mutual funds. Storage, licensing, insurance, repairs, appraisals, all increase the non-recoverable cost of ownership. Costs to acquire or dispose at auction also add the overall cost. And the worst is that one generation does not feel the love for your collection that you do and the market is therefore made smaller and thus, less valuable. Today we talk about "Millennials" that do not want cars made before 2000 or other select groups of cars. Remember, things are only worth what someone else will pay for it at that time.

Second, it is better to collect smart, even if you may love it, or it brings back memories of your youth. Research, study, ask questions, talk to other collectors, use clubs for information, collect smart. Don't forget to use the power of today's Internet for more information. Knowledge is power - knowledge is money. Always try to buy the best that you can, in the best condition possible. Save invoices, records, authentication papers, any document related to your asset. Be prepared to pay capital gains tax if you sell at a profit, based on your total acquisition cost.

Last, plan for what will become of your collectables in the future. You are not going to live forever and you are not allowed to take it with you. Check with your heirs to see if they are interested in your collections. Perhaps you just want to sell it off, which means getting some good appraisals before you do. And consider this thought: the item may be more valuable to your heirs if they inherit it and then sell it, as they will not owe much in taxes ands the item's cost basis is now the fair market value upon your death. This can avoid capital gains taxes. Or you can donate the item to a non-profit with a proper appraisal and take a tax deduction for yourself.


