Memories of my Dad's Cadillac

My father, like most of our dads, was a car guy. He drove DeSotos through the '50's, then a new 1962 Chrysler 300. In the early 1960's, he shifted to GM marques. A 1963 Buick Wildcat and a 1965 Pontiac Bonneville, both convertibles.

Then, in April of 1966, a family friend's son won in a raffle a gorgeous brand-new Cadillac DeVille convertible but could not afford the taxes. My dad offered to trade his Bonneville plus cash for the Cadillac, and just like that the Flamenco Red beauty, with perforated white leather interior and white convertible top, was sitting in our driveway in Cincinnati, Ohio.

My dad loved that car, as would any successful young businessman. My father owned a machine tool company that served customers around the globe, including General Electric and Trane Co. Many of his customers were in the Midwest and he was on the road 3 or 4 days every week. As he justified to my mother, he practically lived in his car, so why shouldn't he enjoy a little comfort and luxury? No argument from 9-year old me!

In August of that year, it so happened our local parish, St. Bartholomew, was also raffling a new Cadillac convertible in Flamenco Red as a fundraiser during the annual church festival. Since my dad's car was identical to the one being raffled (both came from Thompson-McConnell Cadillac in Cincinnati), the church asked if they could "borrow" his car to double the number of places the car could be displayed and raffle tickets sold.

My dad thought this would be a golden opportunity for his son (me) to get more sales experience. After all, I had successfully sold greeting cards for companies who advertised in the back of comic books. Full disclosure...most of those sales came from my 2 aunts who worked at a garment manufacturer and a sign company. I pressed them into service as my selling agents.

In any case, I found my calling. I loved the Cadillac and read every word in the sales literature, so I was already a well versed in the features and options. I was a hit almost instantly. Getting permission from the store managers, my dad would pull the Cadillac up to a K-Mart (you remember those) or Kroger store on a weekend morning and I would politely stop people going in or out and hustle those raffle tickets, \$1.00 each, 6 for \$5.00. Boy, would the church ladies eat this up! I got to know very quickly, who wore the pants in the family when the Mrs. would make her husband get out his wallet! The car practically sold the tickets for me, over \$1,500 worth of raffle tickets over just one weekend. Remember, this was 1966. My dad could not have been more pleased!



Dad went on to own 3 more DeVille convertibles, a 1968 in Regal Silver, a 1969 in Shalimar Gold and a 1970 in Spartacus Blue. And, although I begged him to, he never did buy a 1967 Eldorado. But, I was able to purchase my dream Eldorado back in 2007. I can feel my dad with me when I am behind the wheel!



Get in your Cadillac and cruise regardless of the vehicle's condition or appearance. I enjoy cruising Main Street in Grapevine, Texas, almost every day styling in my 1991 Cadillac Fleetwood Brougham - RWD academy grey, red leather 5.7 liter LT1 Corvette motor and sporting Vogue Tyres. The moment that someone stops for a closer examination of my Cadillac, I immediately describe what year it is, color, make features, open the hood, the doors, the trunk and let them know that not only was it assembled in Arlington, Texas, by Texans but it is 19' 6" long and will easily fit in our 20' garage. It also has six sets of seatbelts and you don't have to have a ladder to get into it. I point out that the carpets are one piece at great expense and something you don't see anymore is all power seat, window lock and recliner buttons are beautifully designed into the top of the armrests instead of the side of the seats. 

Alex Beloff – 11 November 2010. Look closely at the open garage door and my 1957 (Red Lady) top down Cadillac convertible is barely visible. Let's get ready for winter driving.



GARAGE—Do you have a garage? Use it! Put the \$200,000 worth of vehicles sitting in your driveway and park them in the garage. Of course, you will have to remove \$3,000 of junk and push it or drag it to the curb. If you are fortunate to live in Grapevine, Texas, the city will haul it away for free. Thank you Bruno. 
FIRST CADILLAC— Many have asked me what was my first Cadillac. It was a 1956 Cadillac Eldorado Seville Coupe complete with factory air, 2 fours, and saber wheels. Reassigned to Eglin AFB from Vietnam, I bought this rare 305 horse H stock ambassador from renown Cadillac man Joe Dugan Motors, Toledo, Ohio for \$880.00. Note: cold day in Rossford, Ohio, with hot pipes upper left. Photo taken on Highway 98 on Okaloosa Island Fort Walton Beach, Florida (no amusement parks in the background). On frame restoration was performed by Mitchell Olds Cadillac, Pensacola, Florida. The interior leather inserts replaced with light pearl metallic. It was last year for the chrome steering column. A pristine original bat wing 2 fours air breather today has brought \$2,400 on up. Note 1963 Ohio plates.



Fun with high mileage, very affordable Cadillac ambassadors. Example: My 1983 Cadillac Fleetwood Brougham purchased in Columbia, South Carolina. I then drove it to California. It had 153,000 miles on the original drive train. Note: Vogue 7 plates, Vogue Tyres and it had first ever Roadster wire wheels.



PLATES – Connie's new Infiniti Q70L with 20" chrome wheels has plates that read "MY IZZI". My 1991 Fleetwood (a CLC NTX winner) plates read "BELOFF" Vietnam Veteran.







My 1991 CLC NTX 1st place winner was a 1991 RWD Cadillac Fleetwood triple white assembled in Arlington, Texas, sold new at DeVoe Cadillac, Naples, Florida, had 91,000 miles and driven daily. Important – note original Cadillac wire wheels were very nasty but with patience and new Vogue Tyres made this spectacular ambassador.
